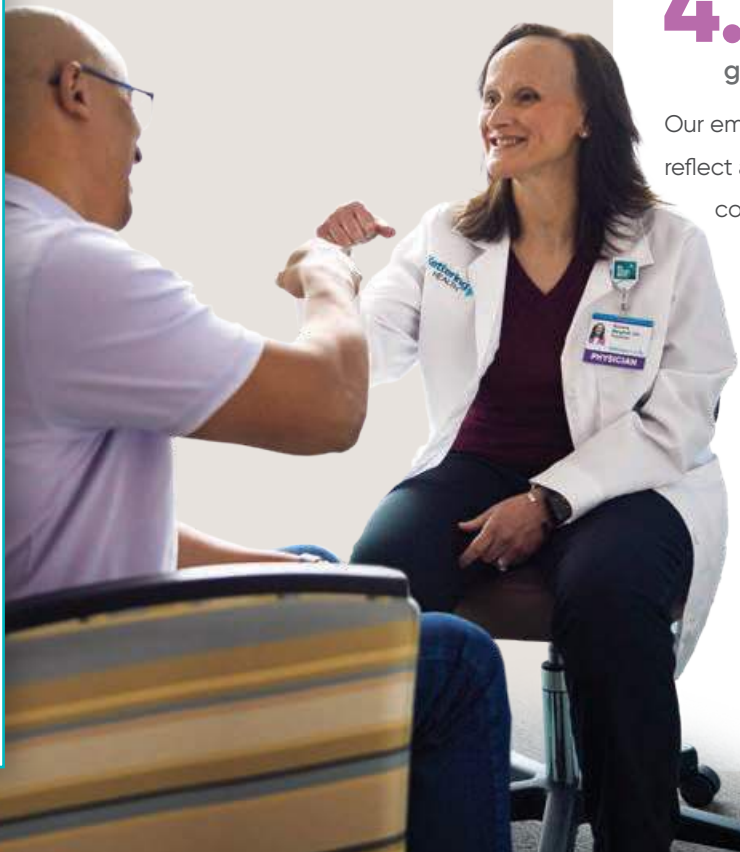

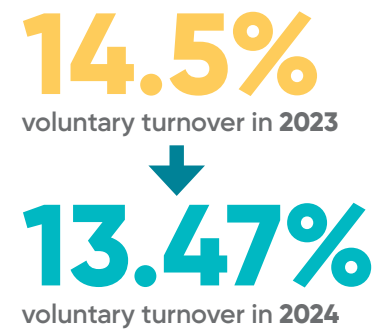

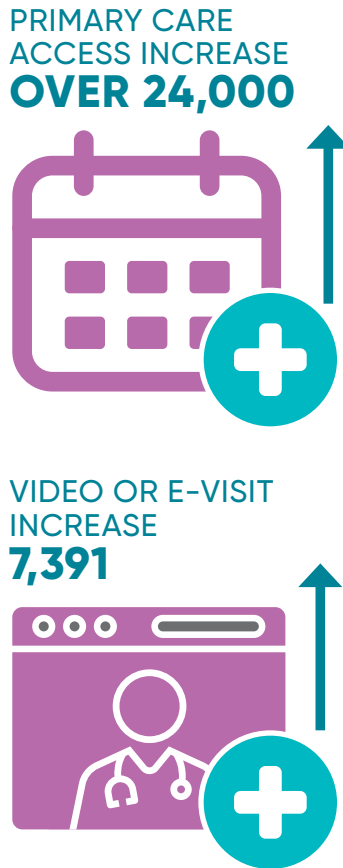
Quality and Safety

Keeping patients safe is of the utmost importance, and it requires effort from every team member. This year, we implemented Safety Stand Downs: an intentional, 30-minute pause to focus on policies and processes that protect those in our care. While critical patient needs continued to be met during this time, Safety Stand Downs gave our employees and providers the opportunity to reaffirm our commitment to safety.



Patients and Consumers

Today's consumers are expecting more in the digital space—and in 2024, we expanded our capabilities to match that. We enhanced our online scheduling, making it easier for our patients to meet with their primary care provider, whether in a video appointment or e-visit. And those upgrades allowed us to serve 7,391 more patients.



Finance and Markets

Our operating margin is defined by our ability to operate at a surplus. It's essentially what remains from our being reimbursed for care after normal business expenses, and we use it to invest back into our organization, such as OR equipment, exam tables, expansion of departments, and IT infrastructure. Along with improving our overall financial standing, we grew our operating margin. And we'll continue to improve it to ensure we equip our teams with what they need to continue giving the best possible patient care.



2024 Year at a Glance

In 2024, we came together as a system to lean into the attributes, values, and hallmarks of Kettering Health that make us our communities' first choice in healthcare.

We asked ourselves important questions about what we do and how we do it—all because of our why: the patient. Throughout the year, we accomplished incredible milestones, charted new paths in patient care, and extended the message of whole-person, compassionate care that can always be found at Kettering Health. We accomplished a lot throughout the year, and we couldn't be prouder of our teams, care providers, support staff, and volunteers. Among all our accomplishments, though, we're most proud of our steadfast dedication to our community—to the patients we cared for, are caring for, and will care for. Expanding at Wilmington

Kettering Health announced investments in a local community with an expansion at our health center in Wilmington, making it Kettering Health Wilmington—our 14th medical center.

The expansions at Kettering Health Wilmington will

augment the current facility's primary care services with hospital beds, surgical services, emergency care, specialty care, full-service imaging, and infusion for cancer treatment.



Ridgeleigh Terrace Becomes Center for Innovation

Kettering Health repurposed the former system corporate headquarters as the Center for Clinical Innovation at Ridgeleigh Terrace. The space is now used by physicians across the system to connect, collaborate, and innovate to benefit patients and communities, emphasizing clinical quality, safety, and efficiency.

Ridgeleigh Terrace was the home of inventor, engineer, and businessman Charles F. Kettering, also the namesake for Kettering Health. The history and legacy of Charles F. Kettering's focus on innovation and the future, represented in his home, makes Ridgeleigh Terrace a fitting site for the innovations launched by Kettering Health physicians.

Launching Bengals Babies

In collaboration with the Cincinnati Bengals, Kettering Health launched our Bengals Babies program, which aims to promote safe sleep and support new parents.

Families who sign up for the program receive a "draft kit" that includes a safe sleep sack and monthly milestone photo props as well as educational resources

to help with breastfeeding, postpartum mental health, and other early parenthood needs.



Finalist for Health Care Worker of the Year

Rachael Sammet, director of Nuclear Medicine at Kettering Health Main Campus, was named as a finalist for the Ohio Hospital Association's Health Care Worker of the Year Award. The annual recognition selects four finalists across the state, and all nominees have a demonstrated history of impactful and influential leadership in healthcare.

Throughout her 14-year career in nuclear medicine, Sammet has implemented processes and technological advancements that improve cancer detection and intervention. Under her direction, Kettering Health Main Campus became the first hospital in the region to offer prostate-specific membrane antigen (PSMA). This helps make cancer imaging and therapy more effective in early stage cancer.

Leap Year and Solar Eclipse Babies

We're blessed to help families welcome little ones across our system each day. And in 2024, some of those days were extra special.

Sixteen babies were born at Kettering Health facilities on Leap Day. And while Dayton entered the path of totality for the solar eclipse, some of our patients entered a new phase of life as they met the newest additions to their family on April 8.

Community Benefit & Impact

At Kettering Health, we're committed to helping our neighbors "be your best." This promise drives us to provide the highest level of care in our facilities and extend our reach into the communities we serve, promoting health and wellness.

Everyday challenges impact the health of people in our region, and we strive to understand and address those concerns. One essential tool in this effort is the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA).

Developed in partnership with the Greater Dayton Area Hospital Association, the CHNA engages community members and partners to collect and analyze health-related data. This data informs community decision-making, prioritizes health issues, and guides strategies to elevate the region's health and well-being.

Using the CHNA insights, we create healthcare education programs and form strategic partnerships that lead to lasting outcomes and healthier communities.

Community Outreach

Working with local communities, our Community Outreach team and initiatives seek to improve the health and lives of families, neighbors, and professionals. Through events, screenings, health fair booths, and more, we're taking the message of whole-person care to area community centers, churches, senior facilities, and festivals.

Improving the Region's Mental Health

Kettering Health joined forces with Declare—a network of local churches and nonprofits—to address Dayton's mental and behavioral health needs. Through this partnership, we provided **\$90,000** in grants to nine faith-based and nonprofit organizations. Recipients included

- United Rehabilitation Services
- Mosaic Church's Fight Chance recovery program
- The Nehemiah Foundation's suicide prevention training
- Mission Addiction's Map for Healing and Recovery program
- Crossover Ministries' Family Mentoring program for refugee families
- His Hope Recovery
- Westwood Right Project
- Impact Xenia
- Big Brothers Big Sisters Miami Valley

This partnership also produced Pathways to Mental Wellbeing, a small group resource developed with Declare leaders and local clergy. These initiatives respond directly to the 2021 CHNA findings, which identified mental health as one of the region's most pressing unmet needs.



Helping Others Navigate Their Health

Launched in January 2022, Kettering Health's Healthcare Navigators program offers a free, confidential service to help community members learn about and access healthcare resources. Founded by three registered nurses with over 75 years of combined experience, the program connects individuals to primary care providers, mental health professionals, specialists, transportation support, and other resources to support health-related social needs.

In 2024, the program served **944 neighbors**—over half of whom were connected to a primary care physician. By providing resources and care, this program empowers community members and exemplifies Kettering Health's commitment to community well-being.

Helping End Food Insecurity and Health Disparities

In partnership with **Gem City Market**, Kettering Health addresses food insecurity and health disparities in our communities who have limited food access. This community-owned grocery store offers groceries, a teaching kitchen, nutrition classes, wellness programs, a mini-clinic, and more.

In 2024, Kettering Health held **28 events** at the market, reaching nearly **700 people**. Events included

- Nutrition classes led by Kettering Health registered dietitians
- Blood pressure screenings conducted by Kettering Health nurses
- Exercise education through "Ask a Fitness Specialist"
- Cooking demonstrations through "Ask a Dietitian"

Partnering with Employers for Better Health

Kettering Health collaborates with businesses to improve workforce health through customized services and events. In 2024, we partnered with 33 businesses, serving 9,153 employees and leaders through

- **4,391 biometric screenings**
- **588 health and education presentations**
- **790 educational booths on healthcare and healthy living**
- **3,384 additional programming events**

These initiatives help businesses foster healthier teams, stronger engagement, and positive workplace cultures. More importantly, these events improve lives, helping people better understand their health, the challenges they face, and how to make lasting changes for healthier lives.



Fostering Dayton's Future Leaders

Kettering Health partners with the Miami Valley Leadership Foundation (MVLf) to empower area youth and families. MVLf's Mentoring2Lead program invests in students, helping them overcome challenges such as loneliness and educational difficulties. Additionally, their Hope4Communities program unites leaders from various sectors to address economic and societal challenges.

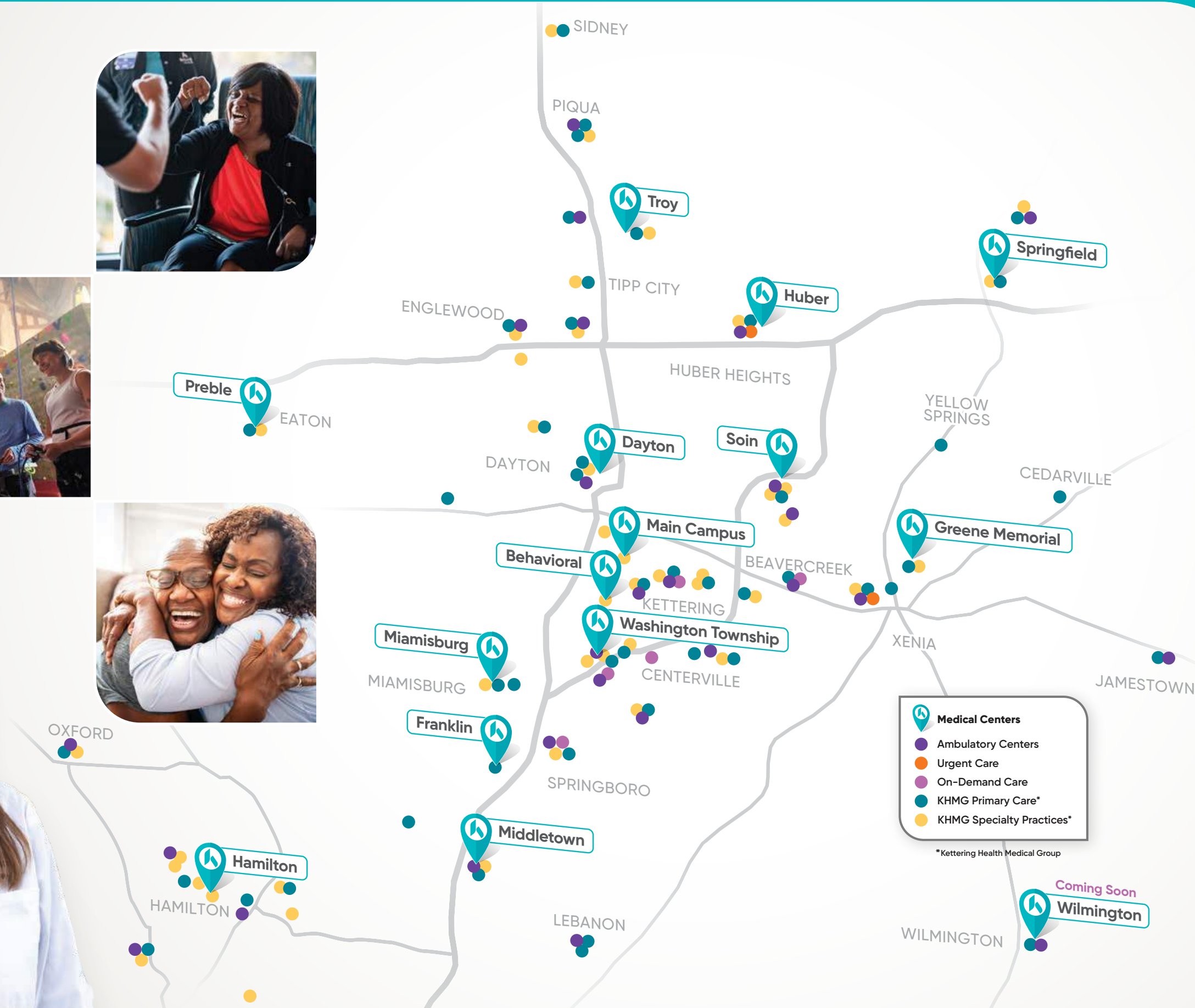
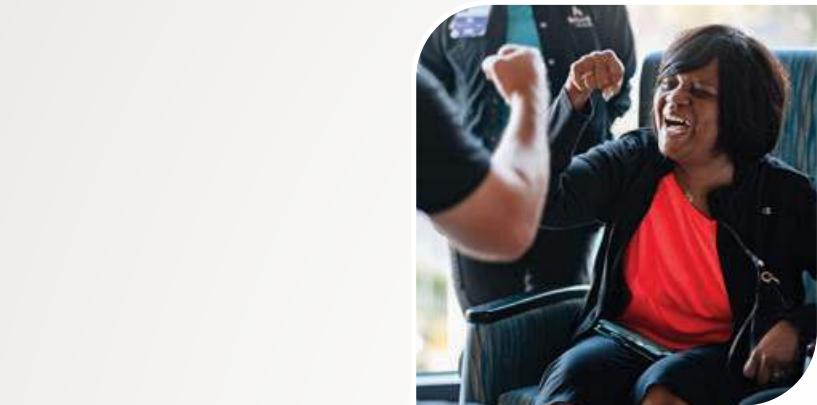
In 2024, Kettering Health supported the Hope4Communities through the Hope4Community Fund, with a total of **\$83,027**. These funds contributed to

- Youth literacy and behavioral health initiatives with local schools
- Food support projects, such as a community garden irrigation system in West Dayton
- Well-being projects, including two Christmas store experiences for lower-income families

MVLf's Christmas stores, supported by a **\$13,500** grant from Kettering Health, served more than 600 children from more than 200 families as well as children from area group foster homes, recovery homes, etc.

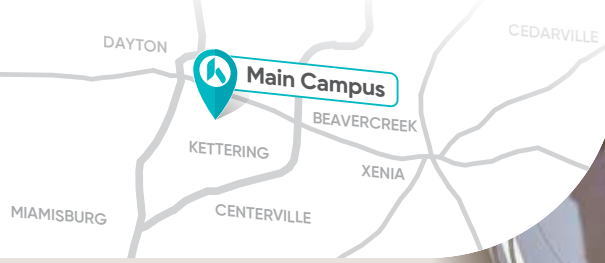

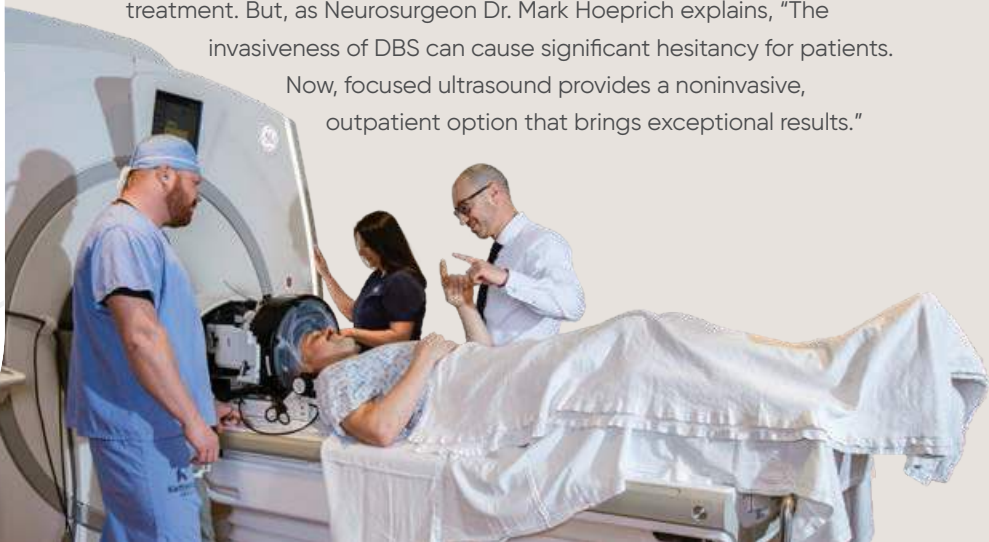

Improving on a Gold-standard Treatment

Kettering Health is the only health system in southern Ohio to offer MRI-guided focused ultrasound to treat tremors. Offered at Kettering Health Main Campus, the incisionless treatment uses sound waves to target small areas in the brain. Heating these targets creates lesions that disrupt irregular brain activity and reduce tremor symptoms.

To date, deep brain stimulation (DBS) has been the gold-standard tremor treatment. But, as Neurosurgeon Dr. Mark Hoeprich explains, “The invasiveness of DBS can cause significant hesitancy for patients. Now, focused ultrasound provides a noninvasive, outpatient option that brings exceptional results.”

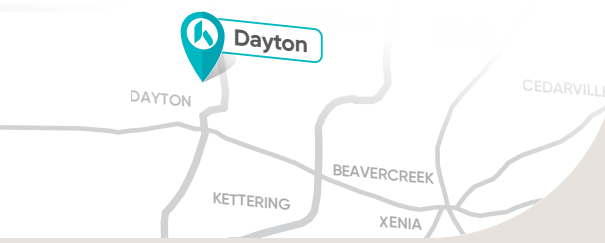

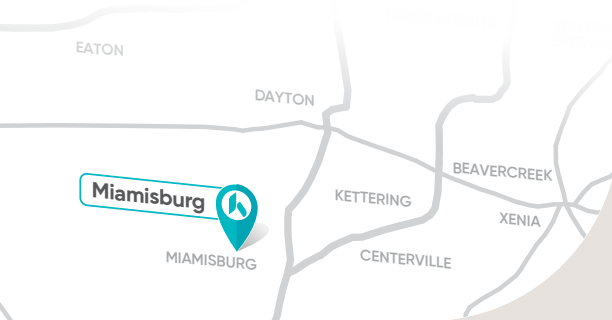

Expanding Mental Health Services

An intensive outpatient program began at Kettering Health Miamisburg on June 4, as an expansion of the program at Kettering Health Behavioral Medical Center. The additional location allows for more collaborative care between behavioral health, primary care, and emergency services.

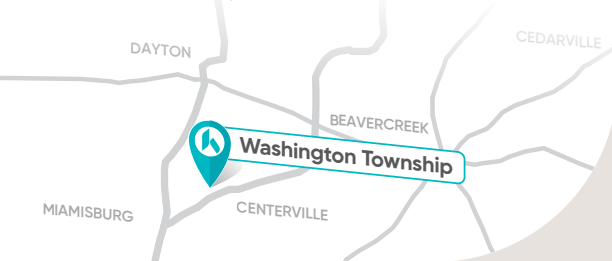

Healing Hands

Seventeen patients received relief from hand and wrist ailments at Hand Day Dayton, an annual event that offers free hand surgeries to those without medical insurance. Some patients were eligible to undergo multiple procedures, resulting in an overall total of 34 free surgeries.

The day brought equal amounts of relief and gratitude for patients like Heather Diamond, who described the day as “a beautiful blessing” while she awaited surgery after suffering from pain for more than six years.

Easier Access to Care

Fort Hamilton Hospital Foundation continued its patient transportation program, helping patients get to appointments at Kettering Health Hamilton’s Wound Center and Cancer Center.

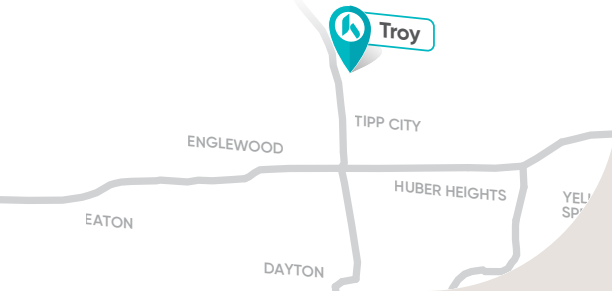

Infusion Care Closer to Home

Kettering Health Troy opened its new ambulatory non-oncology infusion center following renovations to the existing space. The center provides infusion and injection care for patients suffering from compromised immune systems, those in need of infectious disease treatment, and other medical conditions for which treatment is not available through oral medications.

Renovations to the space focused on providing convenient, safe, and specialized care. The updates included the ability for professionals to continue to work while receiving their infusion. Before the center’s opening at Kettering Health Troy, patients had to travel to Kettering Health Washington Township for non-oncology infusions. 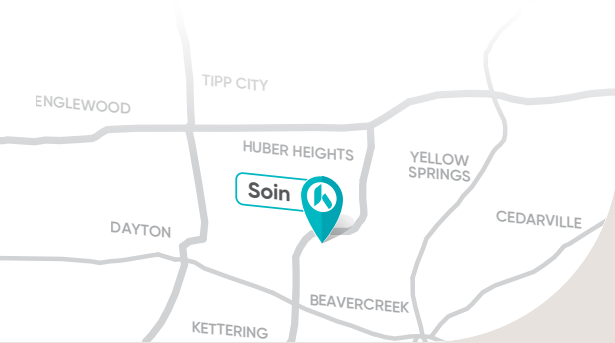

Teaching the Community

With funding from a Health Resources and Services Administration grant, the Soin Family Medicine Residency team developed a culinary medicine program where residents teach a series of classes on cooking whole-food, plant-based recipes to people living in rural areas. Classes focus on teaching budget-friendly recipes, tasting foods, and providing attendees with strategies to adopt this cooking style. 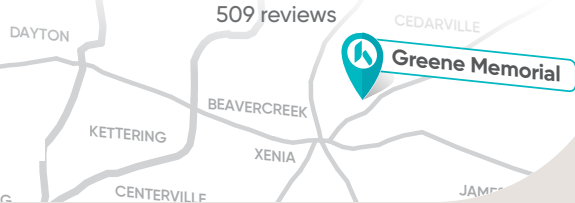
